The Future of College Education: Challenges and Opportunities for FIU

In the last decade we have seen a fast paced change in education. The availability of online courses and online learning components is increasing exponentially. This new form of learning and information delivery has great impact to any university, including ours. On one hand, universities are no longer restricted to their local area of impact and can expand their services to anyone anywhere in the globe. There has to be an added value of attending on-campus courses, such as direct faculty-student and student-student interactions. Some suggestions include: implementing Team-Based Learning techniques, Inverted Classrooms, Experiment-based learning. The inclassroom experience has to bring the social component that will never be replicated online. On-campus classes will train students on the material, but more importantly, on how to navigate the social world. Again, the key here is a high faculty-to-students ratio, and faculty training on these innovative teaching methods.
